Treasurer's Report

Let me begin by commending EL-SOC on an absolutely fantastic year. Despite the immense academic commitment that a degree in the School of Electrical Engineering entails, the society enjoys an endless supply of committed members willing to give their time and effort to help enhance student life at UNSW and the treasury reflects the dividends of this self-lessness.

While this is certainly the driest portion of this newsletter, it's vital for members to appreciate how ELSOC stays afloat.

In 2014 ELSOC received support from a number of corporate sponsors, including Cochlear, Gown Town, NICTA, Activenergy and Spoon Feed Me. This support amounted to \$2,250. ELSOC also received support from the UNSW Faculty of Engineering in the form of a payment of \$1,190. The UNSW School of Electrical Engineering contributed \$6,118.21 in the form of payments towards merchandise and cruise expenses. ARC@UNSW provided grants which totalled \$2,187.19.

To give a quick overview of the 2014 financial report, ELSOC had a

total income of \$25,832.12 and total expenses of \$21,809.41, making a net profit of \$4,022.71. With a starting bank balance of \$4,742.71, the ELSOC account will hold \$9,444.71 at the time of the AGM. In my opinion, this leaves the incoming executive in a very healthy financial position with which to begin 2015.

I'm sure many members will be thrilled that our improved financial position means we can enjoy some more palatable (less ALDI) beverages next year!
